#4 DON'T PRICE COMPARE WITHOUT KNOWING WHAT'S INCLUDED AND WHAT'S NOT

If you or your loved one has chosen cremation, it is important to ask specific questions about how the funeral home handles the process. Will you be allowed to witness the event if you desire? Do they abide by a code of ethics? Do they offer a large selection of commemorative items (such as urns or mementos). Be sure to ask the funeral professional to explain the entire process, so that you understand all the steps- and the costs- you will encounter.
